FROM THE RECTORY

'Troubling Times?' by Edward Hine

Troubling times indeed. Our country is suffering from big structural changes in the economy which is seeing serious issues in our cities with poor accommodation, excessive drinking of alcohol and social unrest. Lifestyles are changing from the traditional to a more modern way which is seeing unprecedented change in how people work and live. Numbers in church are down and religion does not seem to have the central place in everyone's lives that it used to. People are losing their faith and their way.

Possibly you might relate to the first paragraph and recognise the UK now but actually it reflects England in the mid-18th Century. We are past the Civil War and Oliver Cromwell's Commonwealth with the monarchy reestablished. But as the 18th Century draws on we come into the beginning of the Industrial Revolution which sees migration away from the countryside to the cities, breaking with the traditional way of life and loosening the authority and influence of the church.

The church was fairly well set in its ways, but the country was changing around it and this led to the Great Awakening led by evangelists like John & Charles Wesley and George Whitfield. The established church was very much 'high church', traditional, and very much part of the social hierarchy that dominated the country at the time. The Evangelists took a different approach encouraging people to have a personal relationship with Christ through bible reading and regular prayer. Apparently John Wesley preached just about every day and on more than one occasion as he crossed the country on horseback whist other vicars with a good living may not have had to preach at all!

Not only did they have a new message, but they also had new hymns such as Amazing Grace, Love Divine and When I Survey the Wondrous Cross. Not bad for 'new hymns'! This was what started the Great Awakening which boosted numbers at church and so by 1851 the census recorded that of the 18m people in the country over 7m went to church and many, more than once!

There have been other church revivals and in the past, faith has been somewhat cyclical. Are we about to witness another church revival? Possibly! In the Industrial Revolution the world changed very significantly and it has changed even more quickly with the IT revolution of the last 10-15 years.

We worry that there are not many children or families in our congregations, but the world has changed significantly since we went to Sunday School. Who would have thought at Christmas that we would be having services online? Judging from the numbers it looks like significantly more people are joining the services online than used to come to church. Interesting!

Rachel and Sid are running an Alpha Course online which has started very well with attendees with an average age of around their 30's as opposed to when we ran them last decade it was more like 60's. Interesting!

So are we going to see a church revival post Covid-19? The right conditions & circumstances are there. Everyone has had to revaluate their priorities, and many may see the world from a different perspective now. People have had more time to think. As a church we have learnt how to reach out differently and successfully. But the answer really comes down to us and I feel that, at least in our villages and surrounding areas, we have the platform, infrastructure, people and leadership to grow God's Kingdom Wider, Younger, Deeper. It has happened before!

If comparison is the thief of joy, then
Lord, help me to not compare my life
today to my life 6 months ago. Help
me find the joy in THIS life, and in
THIS day and to know that it is from
you, and it is enough. Amen.

READINGS

TRINITY 7

1 Thessalonians 2: 1-8 *The Passion Translation*

2 My dear brothers and sisters, it's obvious that our ministry among you has proven to be fruitful. ²And though we had already suffered greatly in Philippi, where we were shamefully mistreated, we were emboldened by faith in our God to



fearlessly preach his wonderful gospel to you in spite of incredible opposition.

³Our coming alongside you to encourage you was not out of some delusion, or impure motive, or an intention to mislead you, ⁴but we have been approved by God to be those who preach the gospel. So our motivation to preach is not pleasing people but pleasing God, who thoroughly examines our hearts. ⁵God is our witness that when we came to encourage you, we never once used cunning compliments as a pretext for greed, ⁶nor did we crave the praises of men, whether you or others. ⁷Even though we could have imposed upon you our demands as apostles of Christ, instead we showed you kindness and were gentle among you. We cared for you in the same way a nursing mother cares for her own children. ⁸With a mother's love and affectionate attachment to you, we were very happy to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our lives—because you had become so dear to us.



Luke 10: 1-11 The Passion Translation



10 After this, the Lord Jesus formed thirty-five teams among the other disciples. Each team was two disciples, seventy in all, and he commissioned them to go ahead of him into every town he was about to visit. ²He released them with these instructions:

"The harvest is huge and ripe. But there are not enough harvesters to bring it all in. As you go, plead with the Owner of the Harvest to drive out into his harvest fields many more workers. ³Now, off you go! I am sending you out even though you feel as vulnerable as lambs going into a pack of wolves. ⁴You won't need to take anything with you—trust in God alone. And don't get distracted from my purpose by anyone you might meet along the way.

⁵"Once you enter a house, speak to the people there and say, 'God's blessing of peace be upon this house!' ⁶If a lover of peace resides there, your peace will rest upon that household. But if you are rejected, your blessing of peace will come back upon you. ⁷Don't feel the need to shift from one house to another, but stay put in one home during your time in that city. Eat and drink whatever they serve you. Receive their hospitality, for you are my harvester, and you deserve to be cared for.

⁸"When you enter into a new town, and you have been welcomed by its people, follow these rules: Eat what is served you. ⁹Then heal the sick, and tell them all, 'God's kingdom realm has arrived and is now within your reach!' ¹⁰But when you enter a city and they do not receive you, say to them publicly, ¹¹'We wipe from our feet the very dust of your streets as a testimony before you! Understand this: God's kingdom realm came within your reach and yet you have rejected God's invitation!'"

TRINITY 8

Acts 2: 42-47 NRSV

⁴²They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

⁴³Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. ⁴⁴All who believed were together and had all things in common; ⁴⁵they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. ⁴⁶Day by day, as they spent much time together in the



temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, ⁴⁷praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

Matthew 14: 13-21 *NRSV*

¹³ Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. ¹⁴ When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. ¹⁵ When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." ¹⁶ Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." ¹⁷ They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." ¹⁸ And he said, "Bring them here to me." ¹⁹ Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave



them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. ²⁰ And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. ²¹ And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

SITUATIONS VACANT & brief summary of the duties

Health and Safety Officer

 You will be required to use your administrative gifts and work alongside Churchwardens and a health and safety professional to produce risk assessments and documents to enable the opening of our churches and the commencement of worship.

Safeguarding Administrator

You will be responsible for the administration of all Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) applications. This will include:-

- Establishing the true identity of the applicant, through the examination of a range of identification;
- Checking and validating the information provided by the applicant on the application form;
- Ensuring the application form is fully completed and the information it contains is accurate.
- · To keep accurate records of safeguarding training

Treasurer

You will be required to be a trustee of the PCC and maintain the Bookkeeping System and Bank Accounts for this registered charity.

- Basic computer skills including the use of Microsoft Word and Excel Spreadsheets, E-mailing and an understanding of bookkeeping principles will be necessary but formal qualifications are not required.
- The position of Treasurer requires a commitment of up to 6 hours per week and full training will be given to ensure a smooth transition from the existing treasurer who is available to discuss the role with any interested person.

PCC Secretary

- You will be required to have charge of all documents relating to the current business of the PCC, with the exception of the parish electoral roll.
